Welcome to the first edition of the Policing Eastleigh partnership newsletter. I am the new District Commander for Eastleigh and I am delighted to be taking on this new role.



I would like to commit myself to informing you all each month about the work my team is doing in the borough to make Eastleigh safer.

I have always drawn great satisfaction from the outcomes achieved from working in partnership, sharing information, and working collaboratively to serve our communities. Investigation update



Man charged over serious assault in Eastleigh

Officers investigating a serious assault on a 19-year-old woman in Eastleigh have charged a man.

The incident happened at approximately 2.15am on Tuesday, 4 August in Leigh Road Park. The woman was taken to Southampton General Hospital following the attack and suffered soft tissue bruising as a result.

Jeremy Blake Simmons, aged 19, of no fixed address was charged with actual bodily harm, kidnap with intent to commit a sexual offence and threats to kill against the woman. He was remanded in custody, and will appear before Southampton Magistrates Court on Friday 4 August.

CHARGED

Man charged with shoplifting offences after assaulting two police officers

A 33-year-old man was charged with shoplifting offences, following an incident outside the Swan Centre in Eastleigh.

Simon Barnes, of Patrick House in Southampton, had stolen a number of clothing items from fashion store TK Maxx – which were placed underneath his clothing and valued at approximately £92.

He was spotted by an on-duty PCSO, who was liaising with an off-duty Police Sergeant at the time, walking at pace out of the shop and acting suspiciously.

In the ensuing discussions, Barnes began to resist arrest and as a result, assaulted two police officers, as well as a member of the public who had valiantly stepped in to assist the officers.

He appeared at Southampton Magistrates Court on 30 July and was remanded in bail where he is due to next appear in court on Thursday 21 January 2021.

CHARGED

£140,000 worth of cannabis seized and man charged following drug warrant in Eastleigh

Police officers executing a drugs warrant at an address in Eastleigh, charged a 26-year-old man.

Besnik Brihmani, of Dutton Lane was charged with the production of a controlled Class B drug.

A factory of 151 cannabis plants were located at the property and assets with an estimated street value of £140,000 were seized as a result.

Local neighbourhood policing teams and PCSOs patrolled the area, conducting house-to-house enquiries and offered reassurance to the local community.

Brihmani will appear before Southampton Crown Court on Friday 7 August.



Hampshire officers seize £80,000 in drug-related warrant in Eastleigh

Following local community intelligence, Hampshire officers executed drug warrant at an address in Eastleigh, seizing £80,000 in the process.

The warrant, which was executed by specialist officers helped to disrupt a distribution and supply chain of Class A drugs.

Officers searched a property on Longster Road, resulting in the seizure of £80,000 relating to suspected cultivation of drugs and money laundering offences. A cannabis plant, and a large quantity of cocaine were also seized, along with a number of mobile phones and tablet devices.

A 23-year-old man from Eastleigh was arrested at the time of the incident, but released pending further investigation.

We rely upon our communities to contact us and tell us when they have concerns over issues which they feel need police consideration.

Following support from our communities, our teams are working hard to ensure we continue to target those people who persist in committing crime and bringing harm to our communities.

ARREST

Man arrested for possession of amphetamines in stop and search activity in high-spot area

Officers patrolling a hot-spot area for drug-related activity in Eastleigh arrested a 46-year-old man for possession of amphetamines.

The man was seen acting furtively, trying not to make eye contact with officers after they had spotting him acting suspiciously on Beaulieu Road.

Officers spoke to the individual and quickly ascertained that he had cannabis upon him and while being body-searched for any further drug-related offences, officers witnessed him trying to conceal a bag of amphetamines in his left hand.

He was arrested and later de-arrested to be dealt with by Community Resolution.

This particular area continues to be a district priority for our officers in dealing with drug-related activity, and as such, we will be continuing to have a high-profile police presence for the foreseeable future.

COURT RESULT

Man jailed following assault on a teenager on Eastleigh High Street

A man who assaulted a teenage boy in Eastleigh has been jailed for three and a half months.

Connor Oakes, aged 25, assaulted the 14-year-old following an altercation with other members of the boy's family outside of Iceland supermarket, at 4.15pm on Saturday 18 July.

The boy attempted to calm and diffuse the situation but he was pushed to the floor, punched and slapped in the face, resulting in him suffering redness to his face and a bloodshot eye.

Oakes was sentenced at Southampton Magistrates Court to three and half months in jail. He was also ordered to pay costs of £85 to the Crown Prosecution Service, £400 victim compensation and £128 surcharge to fund victim services.

This case is a prime example of successful police partnership working at its best.

A young violent offender has been punished at court and handed a substantial custodial sentence which not only safeguards the victims of his crimes, but also the community as a whole who can now feel safer going about their day-to-day business.

 are also increased reports of thefts from mother vehicles, general crime and public disorder.
